

Report of Canoe Slalom Development Program TIP Continental Asia, Nakhon Nayok Thailand February 18th to 26th 2017 Sustainability & TIPs

A. Presentation

A key point in the establishment of any development program is the sustainability. That means, we have to give the required tools to the young athletes to be ambassadors in their country about global slalom knowledge.

We then can expect them to expand and share their knowledge when they are coming back home. On a medium term, they would be important stakeholders of the development in their NF when they are "retired" from their athletes career.

B. Process

The group was asked to participate at different workshops.

- **Workshop 1: fixing and preparing boats**

Before they start training, athletes repaired boats as any slalom paddler is able to do in the world. They fixed seats, foot-rests, cracks on hule. They were help by the Thai team, all required material for reparation was provided by RCAT.

- **Workshop 2: building gates**

Building gates is a required skill and knowledge to practice Slalom. TIPs had the chance to build the race gates.

- **Workshop 3: sharing knowledge**

Eskimo-roll is a specific skill for any white-water paddler and more specifically for Slalom paddlers. Athletes decided by their own to organize "eskimo-roll teaching sessions"

- **Workshop 4: TIPS as Judges**

With the agreement and the cooperation of the ICF CSL committee, a specific course about Slalom judging in a classroom is given to all the athletes.

Then on, they can judge one of the final in any event if they are available. Afterwards, results of TIP judging are compared with the official judges sheets.

They get a certificate given by the CSL committee and they are identified as "TIPS Judges" and entered in a data bank. We know in the future if they got already judging knowledge. They are also strongly encouraged to spread their knowledge to their training mates

- Advanced (Ludwig): THA (2), NEP (1), TPE (2)

We could have twice trainings a day thanks to the OC which understood clearly that the beginners had to practice more to improve their skills on the course of Nakkhon Nayok.

B. Coaching and equipment

Equipment was made of personal boats for some paddlers and the purchase made by ACC in 2015 as a continental donation of 5 K1 and 5 C1.

Without this donation, the quality of the work would not reach the targets.

D. Global development of canoe slalom in Asia

Thanks to the heavy work and support given by RCAT and Nicolas Noël (National coach for Thai team), a large part of the group already came in the last 2 years in Nakkhon Nayok through the EEWC program and for the Open Thailand. The global level of the group has drastically increased. It gives us the best hope for a fair participation at the Asian Games next year.

For the first time, Asian Championships was organised for U23 and U18. The follow-up in the next years of this championship is a key milestone for the continuous development of the activity. In order to ease the organisation committee, it should be a separated event from the Asian Championships Seniors.
