THE VENUE

Located in the heart of Dartmouth, **Lake Banook** is a naturally occurring lake which hosts three distinct sprint canoe clubs. The lake is steeped in history and has provided opportunities for sprint paddlers since 1904, with the creation of the lake's oldest club, Banook Canoe Club.

Lined with a boardwalk adjacent to the racing course, Lake Banook provides the ultimate spectator experience—perfect for the local community whose passion for canoeing spans over a century. Equipped with a beautiful race course and modern sports facilities, Lake Banook regularly serves as a hub for elite training programs, local events and national competitions.

Lake Banook is named for the Mi'kmaq phrase for "first lake", as it is the first lake in the system that later became the Shubenacadie Canal. The Mi'kmaq people were the first to navigate the waters of Lake Banook, which contributed to the naming of Lake Micmac, Mic Mac Mall, and Mic Mac AAC.

This will be the third ICF Canoe Sprint World Championships to be held in Dartmouth. The previous editions were held in 2009 and 1997.



THE CITY

Situated just a short ferry ride across Halifax Harbour from downtown Halifax, Dartmouth is home to many quaint cafes, noteworthy food joints, shops and a charm all its own.

Dartmouth, also known as the City of Lakes, boasts 23 lakes that provide opportunities for kayaking, windsurfing, canoeing and swimming. Paddle on Lake Banook or visit one of the many parks and walking trails that stretch out into the unspoiled coastal beauty of the Eastern Shore.

Visit the Dartmouth Waterfront to walk along the boardwalk, the ideal place for a photo of the Halifax skyline, or take a boat tour from nearby Fisherman's Cove in Eastern Passage to McNabs Islands.

The Mi'kmaq are native to this rugged, sea-swept peninsula. Their art, music, language and spirituality are just a drum beat away.

The spirit of l'Acadie also echoes deep in our culture, a legacy of the intrepid French settlers who first arrived and settled in Nova Scotia in the seventeenth century. The French were followed, not always harmoniously, by the British, who brought over tens of thousands of Gaelic-speaking settlers from Ireland and Scotland.

New England Planters, Black Loyalists leaving the United States of America after the War of Independence, the Maroons of Jamaica... all continue to contribute to Nova Scotia's distinctive voice and character.



CANOE SPRINT – A BEGINNER’S GUIDE

In canoe sprint, two types of boats are used: **canoe** (C) and **kayak** (K). Canoe sees paddlers compete in a kneeling position using a single-blade paddle. In contrast, a kayak paddler competes in a sitting position using a double-bladed paddle.

Kayak paddlers steer with their feet using a rudder, whereas there is no rudder in a canoe so athletes must use their paddle to steer. As opposed to rowing where boats race backwards, both canoes and kayaks move forwards.

Races take place on a 9m wide flatwater course where boats line up and take off together when the starter signals. The top eight boats from the semi-finals advance to the ‘A’ final, while the boats placing 9th to 16th compete in the ‘B’ final.

The main attraction of canoe sprint is the dynamic and powerful start. Boats go from a still position and dash to top speed in seconds. The shortest distance race is 200m, with the men’s kayak single finishing in about 30 seconds.

The 500m, 1,000m and 5000 metre races require strategic pacing and tactical racing against opponents, with the final sprint to the finish line being extremely fierce. Meanwhile, the key to winning the double and four events is the synchronised paddling skills of teams.

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PARACANOE – A BEGINNER’S GUIDE

Paralympic canoe is exactly like canoeing for able-bodied athletes, enabling those with physical impairments to enjoy the sport and compete at the highest level. Athletes with impairments to the lower body or trunk compete in an individual 200-metre sprint on a straight-line course.

Races are contested by two types of boat, kayak and va'a (which means 'small boat' in the Polynesian language). The kayak is propelled by a double-blade paddle, while the va'a is an outrigger canoe which has a second pontoon as a support float and is used with a single-blade paddle.

Paracanoe made its Paralympic debut in Rio in 2016, with six gold medal events. The va'a was introduced in Tokyo.

Para canoeists use upper body strength to drive their boat through the water, combined with an efficient, dynamic and stable paddling technique.

Kayak These boats are ideally shaped for forward motion at 5.2m long, a minimum of 50cm wide and with a minimum weight of 12kg. The paddles are approximately two metres long and have a water-scooping blade on both sides. Athletes use one paddle and advance by placing the blade in the water alternately on each side of the boat.

Va'a This boat is longer than a kayak at up to 7.3m and has a minimum weight of 13kg, its length giving it more forward force. An outrigger (float) is used on either the left or right side of the boat to maintain balance.

Canoes fitted with an outrigger have long been deployed by Pacific Islanders, but their use in sport is new. The paddles used with va'as have a blade on one side only and propulsion is achieved by placing the paddle on one side of the boat. Particular skill is needed to keep moving straight.

Athletes can modify the seat of the canoe and the inside of the cockpit to suit their individual impairment. A range of devices are used to maintain posture and ensure the athlete is stable and secure within the boat, such as belts to fix the body into the seat.

Classification

Athletes are divided into three groups according to degree of impairment and activity limitation. The classes are **KL1** (athletes who have very limited trunk and no leg function and paddle with shoulders and arms only); **KL2** (athletes who are partially able to use their legs and trunk); and **KL3** (athletes have trunk and partial leg function. They are able to sit with their trunk bent forward in the kayak and are able to paddle by bracing their legs and using their hips).

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS IN CANOE SPRINT

The world championships have taken place every non-Olympic year since 1970, and have officially included paracanoe events since 2010. Last year was the first time an ICF canoe sprint world championships was held in the same year as the Olympics, because of the postponement of the Tokyo Games.

Since 2012 there have been ICF Paracanoe World Championships in Olympic and non-Olympic years.

The first canoe sprint world championships were held in Vaxholm, Sweden, in 1938. There were 12 events contested. In Szeged in 2019 there were 30 events in canoe sprint and 12 in paracanoe.

Dartmouth will be the 47th ICF canoe sprint world championships, and the third time the Canadian city has hosted this event. (2009, 1997).

Hungary has been the most successful nation at the ICF canoe sprint world championships, winning 533 medals (222 gold, 166 silver, 145 bronze). Germany has 313 medals, of which 136 have been gold. In total 54 nations have won ICF canoe sprint world championship medals.

Great Britain has been the most successful nation at ICF paracanoe world championships, winning 71 medals (35 gold, 23 silver and 13 bronze). Brazil has 41 medals, of which 17 are gold. 27 nations have won paracanoe world championship medals.
