Canoeing shines on the biggest stage

It was an Olympic Games to remember as we had the same number of events and quotas for women and men for the first time, marking a significant moment in our push for gender equality.

I am also delighted to report that athletes from four continents picked up medals, demonstrating that our sport continues to grow globally.

Despite the stands being empty, it was a remarkable Games and provided us with a great stage to promote our sport.

We also put on excellent events against the backdrop of the COVID-19 pandemic with World Championships in Canoe Slalom, Canoe Sprint, Paracanoe, Canoe Marathon, Wildwater Canoeing, Canoe Ocean Racing and Stand Up Paddling.

Our team sports Dragon Boat and Canoe Polo were unable to hold competitions but I am confident they will do in 2022 – a year which promises to be action-packed.

Sustainability at heart of future for ICF

The ICF Congress in November heralded a new era for paddle sport as we look to build on the great legacy left by outgoing President Jose Perurena.

There is a lot for us to look forward to with thrilling events planned for 2022 and the new leadership will continue to strive for success both on and off the water.

Sustainability and environmental protection have and will remain an essential part of the ICF as we look to stage carbon neutral competitions in future.

The ICF has finished the year on a high by joining the United Nations' Framework Convention on Climate Change.

This is another vital step forward after pledging our support to initiatives including Paddle for the Planet and the IOC and UN's Clean Seas project.

Canoe Slalom

- Australia's Jessica Fox became the first-ever winner of women's C1 gold at the Olympics courtesy of her victory in Tokyo.
- Slovenia's Benjamin Savsek captured the men's C1 title at Tokyo 2020, while Germany's Ricarda Funk and Czech Republic's Jiri Prskavec sealed the respective women's and men's K1 crowns.
- Funk made canoeing history by becoming the first athlete to win gold at both the Olympics and the ICF Canoe Slalom World Championships in the same calendar year when she triumphed in the women's K1 final in Bratislava, Slovakia.



• Germany's Elena Apel claimed her first international win of her career with women's C1 gold at the World Championships before Fox bounced back to top the standings in the women's extreme slalom, while the men's titles went to Czech Republic's Vaclav Chaloupka in the C1, France's Boris Neveu in the K1 and Great Britain's Joe Clarke in the extreme slalom.

• ICF Canoe Slalom World Cups were successfully staged in Prague, Czech Republic, Markkleeberg, Germany and La Seu, Spain, with the final held in Pau, France where Czech paddler Tereza Fiserova denied Fox a series double, winning the overall women's C1 crown after the Australian took the women's K1 title.

Canoe Sprint

- New Zealand's Lisa Carrington hit the headlines at the Olympics with a hat-trick of golds thanks to her wins in the women's K1 200, women's K1 500 and women's K2 500.
- Hungary finished with three canoeing golds at Tokyo 2020 after victory in the women's K4 500 as well as joy for Sandor Totka in the men's K1 200 and Balint Kopasz in the men's K1 1000, while Brazil, Cuba, Germany, USA and China also tasted success.



- Almost 700 athletes from more than 50 countries headed to Copenhagen, Denmark for the ICF Canoe Sprint World Championships which was being held in the same year as an Olympic Games for the first time.
- Six gold medals were won by Hungary who topped the overall table, while Germany's Conrad-Robin Scheibner starred with victories in the men's C1 500 and men's C1 1000 and Denmark's Emma Jorgensen delivered home success with women's K1 200 gold.
- Two ICF Canoe Sprint World Cups took place in May with Szeged, Hungary and Barnaul, Russia playing host thanks to robust COVID-19 prevention protocols.

Paracanoe



- Paracanoe made its second successive at the Paralympics with Great Britain topping the overall standings courtesy of golds for Charlotte Henshaw in the women's KL2, Laura Sugar in the women's KL3 and Emma Wiggs in the women's VL2.
- Australia's Curtis McGrath left Tokyo 2020 with two golds after triumphs in the men's KL2 and men's VL3.
- Great Britain impressed at the ICF Paracanoe World Championships in Copenhagen, Denmark, with five golds including two for Henshaw.
- Szeged, Hungary staged a ICF Paracanoe World Cup in May which acted as a Paralympic qualifier.




Canoe Marathon



- Hungarians Balazs Adolf and Vanda Kiszli were among the standout performers at the ICF Canoe Marathon World Championships in Pitesti, Romania, winning two golds after success in both the long and short races in the respective men's C1 and women's K1 events.
- Ukraine's Liudmyla Babak also struck twice, claiming gold in the women's C1 long race and short race.
- The event served as a qualification event for The World Games 2022 in Birmingham, USA where canoe marathon will make its debut.

- Bratislava, Slovakia hosted the 37th edition of the ICF Wildwater Canoeing World Championships alongside the Canoe Slalom World Championships in September.
- France impressed with four golds as Lise Vinet claimed an individual title in the women's K1 while the Czech Republic sealed three golds and Germany, Italy and Slovenia also tasted success.



Two-time world silver medallist Michelle Burn finally broke through for a win in the women's K1 while Nicolas Notten swept to victory in the men's K1.

Canoe Polo

- Catania, Italy successfully held the ECA European Canoe Polo Championships but Continental Championships in Africa, the Americas, Asia and Oceania were all cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The ICF Canoe Polo Committee agreed to donate equipment to Argentina in a bid to grow the discipline.

Canoe Freestyle

- The COVID-19 pandemic resulted in the postponement of the ICF Canoe Freestyle World Championships in Nottingham, England from 2021 to 2022 along with World Cups in Columbus, USA.
- The ICF Canoe Freestyle Committee staged its first ever online seminar and examination for judges and international technical officials.

Stand Up Paddling



- Fiona Wylde of the United States and Noic Garioud of France were the star performers at the ICF Stand Up Paddling World Championships in Balatonfured, Hungary, securing two golds each.
- Wylde won the women's long distance crown and Garioud claimed the men's sprint title before they captured the respective women's and men's technical golds.
- Gdynia, Poland was announced as the host of the 2022 SUP World Championships.

Board meetings



Online – March 12–19

- Hosts were announced for a series of events, including Penrith, Australia for the 2025 Canoe Slalom World Championships, Milan, Italy for the 2025 Canoe Sprint and Paracanoe World Championships and Maderia, Portugal for the 2024 Canoe Ocean Racing World Championships.
- The findings of a survey on the COVID-19 pandemic found that 91 per cent of athletes felt safe when attending ICF events.
- The Board unanimously agreed British Canoeing's request to postpone the ICF Canoe Freestyle World Championships, scheduled to be held in Nottingham, England, until 2022.
- A survey of National Federation found that 60 per cent supported a change in the name of the ICF.

Online – April 14

Rome, Italy – November 7

- Thomas Konietzko chaired his first meeting as the new head of the ICF following his election 24 hours earlier and thanked outgoing President Jose Perurena for his outstanding leadership over the past 13 years.
- Christoph Kirsten was confirmed the new whitewater technical manager, replacing Cyril Nivel who had joined Paris 2024 as the canoeing and paracanoe sport manager.
- The Chair of each discipline announced the make-up of their Standing Committees.

Lausanne, Switzerland – December 14

- ICF President Thomas Konietzko hailed the IOC's decision to confirm canoeing as one of the sports on the Olympic programme for LA 28 and underlined his efforts not to lose any quotas.
- The principles for qualification for the Paris 2024 Olympics and Paralympics were outlined and approved by the Board.
- Audience figures from Tokyo 2020 were reported as ICF Secretary General Simon Toulson announced that there were more viewers for canoeing than rowing for the first time at the Olympics and revealed that over 120 million people watched the sport in China.
- The ICF Board voted unanimously to join the United Nations' Framework Convention on Climate Change.

Congress in review

Rome, Italy – November 4–6

- Germany's Thomas Konietzko was elected as the new President of the ICF, beating Russia's Evgenii Arkhipov by 94 votes to 6 with no abstentions.
- Argentina's Cecilia Farias, China's Aijie Liu and Spain's Lluis Rabaneda were elected as Vice Presidents, while Italy's Luciano Buonfiglio was named Treasurer.
- France's Jean-Michel Prono (Canoe Slalom), Japan's Toshi Furuya (Canoe Sprint), Germany's Manuela Gawehn (Wildwater Canoeing), The Netherlands' Ruud Heijselaar (Canoe Marathon), Great Britain's Greg Smale (Canoe Polo), Great Britain's Terry Best (Canoe Freestyle), South Africa's Colin Simpkins (Canoe Ocean Racing) and Canada's John Edwards (Paracanoe) were all elected as Chairs of Standing Committees.
- In a video message, IOC President Thomas Bach paid tribute to outgoing ICF President Jose Perurena who was elected as Honorary President.
- The National Federations of Sierra Leone, Kosovo and Saudi Arabia were approved as members of the ICF.
- ICF Secretary General Simon Toulson thanked organisers and local authorities for working with them to hold events throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.
