The love and passion for our sport was clear to see during a hugely successful Olympic and Paralympic Games in Paris.

Under the leadership of Tony Estanguet, the Games were brilliantly organised and proved to be fantastic for our sport.

The atmosphere was electric across all our competitions with the stands almost completely packed for every session.

The introduction of kayak cross on the Olympic stage was also a great success as we demonstrated our readiness to innovate and adapt in the ever-changing sports landscape while attracting new fans.

Looking ahead to LA28, I am delighted that we have secured Oklahoma City as the host of our Canoe Slalom competition.

This was a major victory for our sport, ensuring canoeing will prominently feature at the Games in four years' time, with the Marine Stadium in Long Beach set to provide a terrific venue for Canoe Sprint.

The Olympic and Paralympic Games in Paris have formed part of a packed calendar of events as we have held World Championships across eight of our 10 disciplines in 2024 as well as putting on numerous World Cup competitions.

Another highlight was the staging of the ICF Hangzhou Super Cup in October that brought together Canoe Sprint, Canoe Slalom, Canoe Marathon and Canoe Polo.

This was an important step forward for our federation as we look to unite our disciplines and engage audiences across our entire sport.

This will be made possible with the establishment of a new headquarters in Budapest that will sit alongside our offices in Hangzhou and Lausanne.

Our centenary year will be remembered as a poignant one in our history as we build towards a successful future, and I am proud to be the President of our federation for the next four years following my re-election.

- Australia's Jessica Fox captured the women's kayak and canoe titles in Paris to become the most successful Canoe Slalom paddler in Olympic history with three golds, one silver and two bronzes.

- France's Nicolas Ghestin followed in Tony Estanguet's footsteps by securing men's canoe gold in front of a packed crowd at the Vaires-sur-Marne Nautical Stadium, while Italy's Giovanni De Gennaro sealed the men's kayak crown.



- The overall World Cup titles went to Australia's Jessica Fox in women's canoe, Germany's Ricarda Funk in women's kayak, Great Britain's Kimberley Woods in women's kayak cross, Slovakia's Matej Benus in men's canoe, France's Anatole Delassus in men's kayak and Great Britain's Joseph Clarke in men's kayak cross.
- Short slalom was introduced as an official ICF event for the first time as part of the first-ever multi-discipline ICF Hangzhou Super Cup.



- Kayak cross made a sensational Olympic debut with New Zealand's Finn Butcher and Australia's Noemie Fox winning historic titles.

- ICF Canoe Slalom World Cups were successfully staged in Augsburg, Prague, Krakow, Ivere and La Seu, where the final was held.

- Jessica Fox of Australia became the first athlete to win three individual gold medals over a single weekend at an ICF Canoe Slalom World Cup courtesy of her hat-trick of titles in Krakow.

Canoe Sprint





- Josef Dostal and Martin Fuksa delivered Olympic golds for Czechia after winning the men's K1 1000m and men's C1 500m respectively, while China underlined their dominance in the men's and women's C2 500m with triumphs for Hao Liu and Bowen Ji and Shixiao Xu and Mengya Sun.
- Pan America enjoyed a clean sweep of the medals in the women's C1 200 with Canada's Katie Vincent coming out on top.



- New Zealand's Lisa Carrington increased her Olympic gold medal tally to eight with a hat-trick of titles in Paris thanks to victories in the women's kayak single, double and four.
- Max Lemke and Jacob Schopf picked up two Olympic titles each with success in the men's K2 and men's K4 for Germany.



- Two weeks after the Olympics, Uzbekistan became the first Asian country to host the ICF Canoe Sprint World Championships as paddlers competed across 20 non-Olympic events in Samarkand.
- Poznan and Szeged held ICF Canoe Sprint World Cups in 2024 with the latter also hosting the European Olympic qualifier and ICF Paracanoe World Championships.
- Canoe Sprint was among the four disciplines that were held as part of the first-ever ICF Hangzhou Super Cup.

Paracanoe



- Algeria's Brahim Guendouz made history by becoming the first African paddler to win Paracanoe gold at the Paralympic Games following victory in the men's KL3 in Paris.
- Women's VL3 made its Paralympic debut to ensure gender equality as Great Britain's Charlotte Henshaw won the title at Paris 2024.
- Australia's Curtis McGrath secured his fourth Paralympic gold with success in the men's KL3.
- All five continents featured on the Paralympic medal table for the first time, with Great Britain finishing first with four golds and four silvers.
- Great Britain also topped the medal standings at the ICF Paracanoe World Championships that was held in Szeged and was a qualifier for the Paralympic Games.



Canoe Marathon



- Sweden's Melina Andersson broke Hungary's Vanda Kiszli's stranglehold on the women's K1 long-distance world title with victory in Metkovic where she also achieved women's K1 short-distance gold.
- Denmark's Mads Brandt Pedersen captured the men's K1 titles over both short and long distances to underline his dominance in the event, while Ukraine's Liudmyla Babak won the women's C1 long-distance crown for a seventh successive time and Poland's Mateusz Borgiel clinched both the men's C1 and men's C2 titles.
- A new mixed relay race was tested at the ICF Canoe Marathon World Cup in Brandenburg.
- Canoe Marathon formed part of the first-ever multi-discipline ICF Hangzhou Super Cup where Andersson, Babak and Pedersen all won two golds each.

Wildwater Canoeing

- France topped the medal standings at the ICF Wildwater Canoeing World Championships by winning 13 of the 22 events in Sabero.
- There was double delight for Slovenia in the men's kayak single with Anze Urankar retaining the sprint title and fellow countryman Simon Oven capturing the classic crown for the second time.
- Laura Fontaine clinched the women's canoe single titles in both the classic and sprint categories as well as helping France win the women's C1 teams sprint and women's C1 teams classic crowns, while compatriot Theo Viens captured five gold medals including the men's C1 title.
- Veles and Mezzana hosted ICF Wildwater Canoeing World Cups featuring classic and sprint races in back-to-back weeks in June.

- Germany's Gordan Harbrecht became the first-ever European paddler to win the overall men's surfski single title at the ICF Canoe Ocean Racing World Championships with victory in Madeira.
- Kira Bester overcame fellow South African Michelle Burn to win the overall women's SS1 world crown, while Spain's Victor Rodriguez and Chloe Bennett defeated compatriot and defending champions Walter Bouzan and Judit Verges to clinch mixed surfski double gold.
- Reunion, France successfully hosted a ICF Canoe Ocean Racing World Cup in November.

Canoe Polo



- Germany retained the men's title with a 2-1 triumph against France in what was the first ICF Canoe Polo World Championships to be held in Asia for 20 years with Deqing, China playing host.
- New Zealand swept aside Italy 6-1 to capture their first women's world crown since 2016.
- Canoe Polo featured in the first-ever multi-discipline ICF Hangzhou Super Cup where Germany and Spain won the respective men's and women's titles.

Canoe Freestyle



- Great Britain's Ottlie Robinson-Shaw marked her return from a serious shoulder injury to win two gold medals at the first ICF Canoe Freestyle World Cup in Plattling, Germany.
- Landon Miller of the United States also clinched two titles in Plattling which will stage the 2025 ICF Canoe Freestyle World Championships.
- The second ICF Canoe Freestyle World Cup finished two days earlier than planned due to rising water levels as France's Tom Dolle and Japan's Hitomi Takaku secured the respective men's and women's kayak crowns.



Stand Up Paddling



- Andrii Kraitor of Bulgaria and Katniss Paris of the United States made history by becoming the first-ever winners of the respective men's and women's 100m sprint titles at the ICF SUP World Championships in Sarasota.
- France's Noic Garioud bounced back from the disappointment of failing to defend his sprint crown by capturing the men's technical title, while Duna Gordillo got the better of fellow Spaniard Esperanza Barreras to seal women's technical gold.
- Barreras made it three women's long distance titles in a row, while Japan's Shuri Araki struck gold in the men's long distance.
- ICF SUP World Ranking Events were staged in Italy, Austria and Sweden before Greece held an ICF SUP World Cup in September.

- Indonesia and Thailand became the first teams to secure quotas for Chengdu 2025 with success at the ICF Dragon Boat World Cup in Yichang.

Board meetings



Online – January 10

- Plans to move forward with negotiations over the establishment of a satellite office in Hangzhou were approved by the ICF Board.
- A joint online meeting for all the Board members with the heads of all the departments was announced to exchange news and information, making the first step to improve communication in decisions and make the process more transparent to all stakeholders.
- The Board members supported the proposed agenda for the ICF Congress 2024 and agreed that due to the variety of topics and the anniversary of the federations, workshops should be avoided and instead the ECA should be given the chance to hold its Extraordinary Congress on November 9.

London, Great Britain – April 5 to 6

- ICF Vice President Cecilia Farias presented a comprehensive report on the ICF development programmes, emphasising the importance of coach education with more than 500 coaches trained and numerous seminars conducted.
- Paris 2024 Canoe and Paracanoe Sports Manager Cyril Nivel gave an update on preparations for the Olympics and Paralympics, including infrastructure developments and successful ticket sales.
- The Board members agreed to continue to move forward with YouTube as its streaming provider, reviewing the opportunity to utilise the pay-per-view option when possible.
- ICF President Thomas Konietzko praised the professionalism and dedication of the ICF Finance Commission members, highlighting the significant improvements in financial management over the past year.
- ICF Secretary General Richard Pettit shared the rebranding proposal to change the ICF's name to Paddle Worldwide, citing strategic reasons for the move, which the Board voted in favour of implementing.
- Reports were presented by each of the Standing Committees, Sports Commissions and Continental Associations while a financial update was given by ICF Treasurer and Acting Vice President Luciano Buonfiglio.
- The five locations of the 2026 ICF Canoe Slalom World Cup Series and destinations for three ICF Canoe Sprint World Cups 2026 were officially confirmed.
- Numerous hosts were also announced for a series of major events including the ICF Canoe Ocean Racing World Championships from 2025 to 2028, the ICF Wildwater Canoeing World Championships in 2025, the ICF Canoe Marathon World Championships in 2028, the ICF Stand Up Paddling World Championships in 2025 and 2026 and the ICF Canoe Polo World Championships in 2028.

Online – July 2

- ICF President Thomas Konietzko hailed the announcement that Oklahoma will host the Canoe Slalom competition at the Los Angeles 2028 Olympic Games, expressing his gratitude for the collaboration with the IOC, LA28 and partners in Oklahoma.
- The Board members voiced their disappointment at the IOC's decision to move from the sports programme to the engagement programme for the Dakar 2026 Youth Olympic Games as IOC Sports Director Kit McConnell explained the rationale behind the move.
- The opening of the satellite office in Hangzhou and partnership between the ICF and BYD were celebrated, while updates were given on final preparations for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games as well as information on plans for celebrations at the new French Federation headquarters and an ICF centenary dinner during the Games.

Online – October 2

- The Board decided that National Federations must pay membership fees to be eligible to vote, emphasising the importance of financial compliance and participation in governance processes.
- Togo's request to operate independently from the Rowing and Canoe Federation was approved by the Board, showcasing the ICF's flexibility and support for National Federation autonomy.
- The membership of the Central African Republic was given the green light by the Board, indicating the ICF's ongoing expansion.

Antalya, Turkiye – November 6

- ICF President Thomas Konietzko opened the meeting by expressing his gratitude to all the Board members for their dedication and contributions over the past three years.
- ICF Secretary General Richard Pettit provided a review of the 2025-2026 budget, with the focus remaining on ensuring clarity, accountability and due diligence in allocations, supported by robust financial systems established over the past two years. He spoke about the introduction of the Innovation Fund and the development of dashboards to promote greater transparency and efficiency.
- The Fit for Future Evolution strategy and the plan to seek endorsement for the name change to Paddle Worldwide at the Congress was presented along with the proposed structure for the offices in Lausanne and Hangzhou and the new headquarters in Budapest.
- A new ICF Code of Ethics, highlighting its alignment with IOC principles but tailored to fit the ICF's needs, was approved by the Board.
- An update was given on the transgender policy working group which has carried out extensive research, stakeholder consultations, and analysis of existing international policies.
- ICF Vice President Luis Rabaneda shared the progress of the Olympic Qualification Working Group which has completed defining its scope and objectives, conducted consultations with National Federations and gathered feedback on rules for both Canoe Sprint and Canoe Slalom.
- The Board of Directors unanimously adopted two resolutions. One of the resolutions was the relocation of the ICF headquarters to Hungary. The second resolution was granting the Board the authority to withdraw from the relocation process at any time after the Congress' decision.
- The Board also unanimously adapted the amendment to the Statutes required to the relocation of the headquarters with the effectiveness from the Hungarian authorities.

Antalya, Turkiye – November 9

- A moment of mourning was held for Canada's Frank Garner, the long-serving ICF Board of Directors and Executive Committee member who passed away.
- ICF President Thomas Konietzko welcomed newly-elected Board of Directors members and outlined the responsibilities of the Vice Presidents with Cecilia Farias continuing to focus on development, sustainable practices, and gender equality, Lluis Rabaneda remaining responsible for sports disciplines and related issues, and Luciano Buonfiglio will handle cooperation with Continental Associations and manage international relations.
- Wai-hung Luk was unanimously approved as the Chair of the ICF Dragon Boat Commission.
- Maree Burnett was unanimously approved as the Chair of the ICF Finance Commission which also includes Nick Donald of Great Britain, Suzanne Britt of the United States, and Farhad Aliyev of Azerbaijan.
- The make-up of all the Committees and Commissions were also decided after members were proposed by the respective Chair.
- Mr Konietzko outlined his vision for the ICF's organisational review, aiming to strengthen the federation's structure, procedures, and policies to enhance operational efficiency, governance and global engagement.
- Skopje, North Macedonia and Banja Luka, Bosnia and Herzegovina were rubber stamped as hosts of the 2025 ICF Wildwater Canoeing World Cups.

Congress in review

Antalya, Turkiye – November 7–8

- Germany's Thomas Konietzko was re-elected as President of the ICF, securing 87 votes in favour and one abstention.
- Argentina's Cecilia Farias and Spain's Lluis Rabaneda i Caselles were re-elected as ICF Vice President, while Italy's Luciano Buonfiglio was elected as Vice President having previously held the role on an interim basis.
- China's Xin Li was elected as the ICF Treasurer in the third round of votes, beating Hungary's Peter Karai by 47 votes to 34, with four abstentions.
- Australia's Richard Fox was elected as Chair of the ICF Canoe Slalom Committee, while Belgium's Marian Sarbu beat South Africa's Colin Simpkins by 54 votes to 31 to become Chair of the ICF Canoe Ocean Racing Committee and Hungary's Noemi Horvath beat Moldova's Martin Marinov by 58 votes to 28.
- Japan's Toshi Furuya (Canoe Sprint), Germany's Manuela Gaweijn (Wildwater Canoeing), Netherlands' Ruud Heijseelaar (Canoe Marathon), Great Britain's Greg Smale (Canoe Polo), Great Britain's Terry Best (Canoe Freestyle) and Canada's John Edwards (Paracanoe) were all re-elected as the Chair of the respective Committee, while Great Britain's Jane Gibson was elected Chair of the ICF Medical and Anti-Doping Committee.
- Great Britain's Albert Woods, Hungary's Istvan Vaskuti, Czechia's Jaroslav Pollert and France's Jean-Michel Prono were approved as ICF Honorary Members.
- In a video message, IOC President Thomas Bach celebrated 100 years of progress at the ICF in a special speech marking the organisation's centenary.
- The Congress overwhelmingly approved the relocation of the ICF's headquarters to Budapest, Hungary.
- Central African Republic became the newest member of the ICF after the Congress voted unanimously in favour of the nation's application. The decision increased the ICF's membership to 171 countries.
- ICF Secretary General Richard Pettit unveiled the new Fit for Future Evolution strategy, with the priorities including enhancing administrative support, strengthening governance and decision-making, advancing the development model, evolving event delivery and expanding digital initiatives.
- The Congress voted in favour of the new name of the International Canoe Federation as Paddle Worldwide. The new name will be applicable from the next ICF Congress in 2026.
- Oklahoma City, United States, was awarded the hosting rights for the 2026 ICF Congress.
