THE VENUE

Lake Bagsvaerd has been used for international canoeing events for many decades. The Danish national team trains at this venue every day. We are working on the best conditions for the athletes and coaches for the world championships.

We are involving our national athletes in the planning of the team quarters. We are creating different areas with Danish “hygge” [a quality of coziness = feeling warm, comfortable, and safe - has to be experienced].

The coaches can expect a relaxing lounge where they can prepare and watch replays of the races. The bleachers are only a few metres from the waterfront, giving the fans a unique opportunity to get very close to the action on the water.

THE CITY

Copenhagen, the largest city in Scandinavia, has a history of being one of the world’s great design capitals. A city steeped in history, so evident and beautifully preserved in its medieval streets and 17th century canals, sumptuous palaces, copper-roofed town houses and atmospheric cobblestoned squares.

At the same time it is a city that never stands still. Though smaller than many other Northern European cities, the Danish capital has proven itself more than able to organise successful large-scale events in innovative and appealing settings.

The city’s mix of water activities, tradition and modernity will set the perfect background for the celebration of the 100 year anniversary of the Danish Canoeing Federation. Denmark and its capital are proud of their environmental record as not only one of the safest, but also as one of the cleanest and most comfortable cities in the world.

The crystal-clear waters and the clean air of this capital by the sea provide a comfortable environment for all its visitors.



CANOE SPRINT – A BEGINNER’S GUIDE

In canoe sprint, two types of boats are used: **canoe** (C) and **kayak** (K). Canoe sees paddlers compete in a kneeling position using a single-blade paddle. In contrast, a kayak paddler competes in a sitting position using a double-bladed paddle.

Kayak paddlers steer with their feet using a rudder, whereas there is no rudder in a canoe so athletes must use their paddle to steer. As opposed to rowing where boats race backwards, both canoes and kayaks move forwards.

Races take place on a 9m wide flatwater course where boats line up and take off together when the starter signals. The top eight boats from the semi-finals advance to the ‘A’ final, while the boats placing 9th to 16th compete in the ‘B’ final.

The main attraction of canoe sprint is the dynamic and powerful start. Boats go from a still position and dash to top speed in seconds. The shortest distance race is 200m, with the men’s kayak single finishing in about 30 seconds.

The 500m and 1,000m races require strategic pacing and tactical racing against opponents, with the final sprint to the finish line being extremely fierce. Meanwhile, the key to winning the double and four events is the synchronised paddling skills of teams.

PARACANOE – A BEGINNER’S GUIDE

Paralympic canoe is exactly like canoeing for able-bodied athletes, enabling those with physical impairments to enjoy the sport and compete at the highest level. Athletes with impairments to the lower body or trunk compete in an individual 200-metre sprint on a straight-line course.

Races are contested by two types of boat, kayak and va'a (which means 'small boat' in the Polynesian language). The kayak is propelled by a double-blade paddle, while the va'a is an outrigger canoe which has a second pontoon as a support float and is used with a single-blade paddle.

Paracanoe made its Paralympic debut in Rio in 2016, with six gold medal events. The va'a was introduced in Tokyo.

Para canoeists use upper body strength to drive their boat through the water, combined with an efficient, dynamic and stable paddling technique.

Kayak These boats are ideally shaped for forward motion at 5.2m long, a minimum of 50cm wide and with a minimum weight of 12kg. The paddles are approximately two metres long and have a water-scooping blade on both sides. Athletes use one paddle and advance by placing the blade in the water alternately on each side of the boat.

Va'a This boat is longer than a kayak at up to 7.3m and has a minimum weight of 13kg, its length giving it more forward force. An outrigger (float) is used on either the left or right side of the boat to maintain balance.

Canoes fitted with an outrigger have long been deployed by Pacific Islanders, but their use in sport is new. The paddles used with va'as have a blade on one side only and propulsion is achieved by placing the paddle on one side of the boat. Particular skill is needed to keep moving straight.

Athletes can modify the seat of the canoe and the inside of the cockpit to suit their individual impairment. A range of devices are used to maintain posture and ensure the athlete is stable and secure within the boat, such as belts to fix the body into the seat.

Classification

Athletes are divided into three groups according to degree of impairment and activity limitation. The classes are **KL1** (athletes who have very limited trunk and no leg function and paddle with shoulders and arms only); **KL2** (athletes who are partially able to use their legs and trunk); and **KL3** (athletes have trunk and partial leg function. They are able to sit with their trunk bent forward in the kayak and are able to paddle by bracing their legs and using their hips).

WALZ/GERMADE (ESP) – Exciting Spanish combination coming together for this new Olympic event. Walz a 1000 metre gold medalist from Rio, Germade was a member with Walz of Spain's K4 500 silver medal team in Tokyo.

BURGER/BEAUMONT (FRA) – Combines the raw speed of 200 metre specialist Beaumont with the 1000 metre stamina of Burger.

ERDOSSY/KOPASZ (HUN) – Any boat with Balint Kopasz in it has to be fast.



MEN'S K4 500

BELARUS – Same crew exactly who finished fifth at the Tokyo Olympics, so have familiarity on their side.

GERMANY – Totally new crew from the boat which won gold in Rio. Still expected to perform strongly.

SPAIN – A different combination from the boat which won silver in Tokyo, but has plenty of speed and experience.

HUNGARY – Has Tokyo 1000 metre gold medalist Kopasz and K1 200 fourth place Kolos Csizmadia, so should go well.

RUSSIA – Three of the crew who finished fourth at Tokyo Olympics are in this boat.





WOMEN'S K4 500

HUNGARY – Gold medalists from Tokyo. Have dominated this event at an Olympic and world championship level. Gold in London and Rio, and unbeaten world champions since 2017.

BELARUS – Silver medalists in Tokyo, London and Rio, silver medalists at the 2019 ICF world championships.

POLAND – Bronze medalists in Tokyo, this is a new combination. Bronze medalists at the 2019 and 2018 ICF world championships.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS IN CANOE SPRINT

The world championships have taken place every non-Olympic year since 1970, and have officially included paracanoe events since 2010. This year will be the first time an ICF canoe sprint world championships will be held in the same year as the Olympics, because of the postponement of the Tokyo Games.

Since 2012 there have been ICF Paracanoe World Championships in Olympic and non-Olympic years.

The first canoe sprint world championships were held in Vaxholm, Sweden, in 1938. There were 12 events contested. In Szeged in 2019 there were 30 events in canoe sprint and 12 in paracanoe.

Copenhagen will be the 46th ICF canoe sprint world championships, and the fourth time the Danish capital has hosted this event. (1950, 1970, 1993).

Hungary has been the most successful nation at the ICF canoe sprint world championships, winning 515 medals (216 gold, 158 silver, 141 bronze). Germany has 308 medals, of which 134 have been gold. In total 53 nations have won ICF canoe sprint world championship medals.

Great Britain has been the most successful nation at ICF paracanoe world championships, winning 61 medals (30 gold, 18 silver and 13 bronze). Brazil has 38 medals, of which 16 are gold. 26 nations have won paracanoe world championship medals.

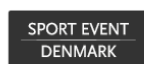

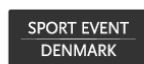
